Dear Doctor Smith:

Following the tour this morning which you and Dr. Robert Walker made of the New Jersey College Infirmary with Miss Thompson and me with a view to using our facilities as one of the city's four casualty stations in case of emergency, we agreed that the following equipment will have to be provided before we can feel set to handle the burns, hemorrhage, shock, fractures and minor surgery which a disaster implies:
